THE TEXAS OPPORTUNITY & JUSTICE INCUBATOR

To expand access to justice for low- and moderate-income Texans and to train new lawyers, the State Bar of Texas has pledged a substantial organizational and financial commitment for 2016-2017 to create the Texas Opportunity & Justice Incubator (TOJI). The goals: (1) to match beginning lawyers who want to build their own practices with Texans' unmet legal needs, and (2) to establish a model for similar incubator projects throughout the state.

Why is it needed?


Only one in five low-income Americans with civil legal needs finds help; for middle-income Americans, only two in five. Also, 10 months after graduation, only 60 percent of law school graduates hold jobs requiring a J.D. The Texas Opportunity & Justice Incubator addresses both of these needs.

How does it work?

TOJI will provide office space and training for a select group of new attorneys who want to build their own practices. In the 18 months they participate in the incubator, attorneys agree to represent low- and modest-income clients while learning how to run a law office with a focus on technology. A learning lab will also coordinate pro bono opportunities for participants, oversee and track pro bono cases and outcomes, and coordinate training and mentoring of incubator attorneys.

How can I get involved?
